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School District of Philadelphia - Preliminary FMP Options Report Executive Summary

In September 2010, the School District of Philadelphia, along with the guidance of the URS Corporation Team of Consultants embarked on a journey to right size the District. Right-sizing the District will entail an effort to reduce seats as a result of fewer children are utilizing the school system while also ensuring an equitable distribution of resources in each Philadelphia community and at every grade level; resulting in more school choice with access to program options and improved learning environs for all students.

This report provides a summarized view of options that we believe meet the objectives of the right-sizing process. During the course of planning we have used various inputs to provide a fair and equitable determination of each schools needs. The primary objective of this report is to inform the District of some viable options and to allow the District to provide some feedback on the "realities" of the schools in the District and their needs, such as community sentiment, special achievements, etc. An accompanying memorandum with narratives explaining the rationale for the preliminary options listed in the ES, MS, and HS spreadsheets is also included.

This preliminary options report will ultimately be used in the development of the final options presented to the SRC, as well as a guideline for the Final FMP Report that will outline the future Capital Plan for the District. A draft outline for the Long Range Facilities plan has been included for review.

SUBJECT: Narrative of Recommendations

Over the past three months, a small working team along with URS has reviewed District data on enrollment, capacity, utilization, student migration trends, and facility condition to develop a set of recommendations to be implemented under the Facilities Master Plan. The recommendations are organized into three phases. A brief narrative about each recommendation is provided in the tables below. The recommendations were formed to do the following:

- · Standardize grade configuration and school sizes
- · Optimize utilization through school closure and consolidation
- · Improve elementary-middle-high school feeder alignment and balance
- · Eliminate excess capacity by disposing of surplus property
- · Achieve savings and efficiencies through consolidation of administrations
- · Achieve savings and efficiencies through termination of lease agreements and relocating programs into District-owed facilities
- · Propose priorities for capital improvements and major renovations

The accompanying spreadsheet summarizes the net impact if the recommendations are adopted.

A review with the Senior Leadership Team and Associate Superintendents is scheduled for Tuesday, March 22<sup>nd</sup> from 10AM-1PM.

## Phase I/Year I (changes effective for SY11-12)

The following options are recommended for implementation in Phase I.

4	W	Add grade 6 to Mann Elementary School	<ul> <li>Mann is a K-5 elementary school serving 420 students. It became a Renaissance Charter in SY10-11 and is operated by Mastery.</li> <li>Presently, students from Mann feed Beeber Middle School.</li> <li>Mastery has requested the addition of grade 6 at Mann to create a direct feeder to its 7-12 program at Shoemaker.</li> <li>Approving this option will reduce the number of feeder schools into Beeber from 4 to 3. Utilization and enrollment at Beeber will also</li> </ul>

5	W	Lamberton	<ul> <li>Lamberton is a K-12 school serving 840 students.</li> <li>Lamberton has two sets of administrators for the school (school is on one campus)</li> <li>Savings can be achieved by consolidating to one administration for the K-12 program.</li> </ul>
6	NW	Surplus disposal- Ada Lewis Middle School	Current unoccupied surplus property
7	NW	Close Ellwood Annex. Change grade configuration of Ellwood to K-5 elementary school.	<ul> <li>Ellwood is a K-6 elèmentary school serving 427 students. Ellwood is an Empowerment School.</li> <li>The District leases Holy Angels School from the Archdiocese. Each year, the District has reduced the number of rooms leased. Current lease agreement expires June 2011. Annual cost for rent is \$60K.</li> <li>By closing the annex all students would be consolidated into the main Ellwood building; however accommodating 6<sup>th</sup> grade students would be difficult.</li> <li>Option is recommended for implementation Year 1. School would convert to a K-8 elementary school and be a direct feeder to Vaux High School (SY10-11 Promise Academy)</li> <li>If option is adopted, Rhodes and FitzSimons High School will lose a feeder school. The school is overcapacity and the building has a high FCI (87%). Smedley became a Renaissance Charter School operated by Mastery for SY10-11.</li> <li>Presently, students from Smedley attend Harding for middle school.</li> <li>Harding is 6-8 middle school serving 790 students. Harding is an Empowerment School.</li> <li>By removing Smedley as a feeder school, enrollment and utilization at Harding will continue to drop. (other feeders to Harding: Sullivan, Stearne, Marshall, Lawton, Bridesburg). Current utilization at Harding is 58%</li> <li>Smedley is overcrowded and cannot accommodate sixth grade with additional capacity. District and Mastery to partner on capital improvements and construction of an addition.</li> <li>Students become direct feeder to Mastery at Lenfest for grade 7.</li> <li>Note: Will Mastery be required to admit all students? This trend is expected to continue.</li> <li>The building has a high FCI (91%) and needs to be renovated.</li> <li>The School District entered into an agreement with the Marconstruction of a new community center on the Mayfair ca.</li> <li>The District should negotiate use of classroom space and space in the Perzel community center for use by the Mayfair.</li> </ul>
